

Klaus L. Aurisch



Klaus Aurisch is a business consultant in European Union matters, a German attorney and a university lecturer in international relations. As a German career diplomat he has served in various bilateral and multilateral diplomatic and consular functions throughout the world and at the Foreign Office in Bonn between 1966 and 2001.

In the United States he was Consul General of Germany for the Southwestern states from 1991-1997 and Dean of the Consular Corps in Houston from 1995 to 1997, Deputy Consul General in Los Angeles, and Counselor at the German Mission to the United Nations in New York. From 1997 to 2001 he served as Consul General for Eastern France in Strasbourg.

He was born in Koln (Cologne), Germany, and holds a doctor of law degree from the University of Cologne as well as diplomas in political science from the Bologna Center of the Johns Hopkins University's Paul H. Nitze School of Advanced International Studies, Institut d'Etudes Politiques in Paris, and was assistant professor at the Faculty of Law, Cologne. In 1988 he was appointed fellow at the Weatherhead Center for International Affairs, Harvard University.

During his 35-year career, Aurisch has held foreign service posts at embassies in Greece, Sudan, the multilateral missions to the United Nations in New York and Vienna, consulates in Yugoslavia, Los Angeles, Houston and Strasbourg. He has also served posts at the foreign office dealing with general political, NATO, science and environmental matters. He served as a delegate to many international conferences in Brussels, Geneva, London, Paris, Leiden, Helsinki, Oslo, Moscow, Bucharest, Montreal, Montevideo, and Nairobi.

In the academic field he was an assistant professor teaching the fundamentals of German law at the University of Cologne in the 1960s. In 2000-01 he taught a course in international relations at the University of Freiburg, Germany.

He is fluent in German, English, French and Italian. He has published articles on European community law and international negotiation. His academic interests are trans-Atlantic relations, German-French relations and the European Union.
